Humboldt leads cities in housing starts

The City of Humboldt is leading all cities in Saskatchewan in per capita housing starts according to statistics compiled by the Saskatchewan Building Officials Association.

The statistics reflect the period of January to June 2006 and show Humboldt with 1.74 units per thousand persons, Weyburn is second with 1.55 per thousand persons and Saskatoon in fourth with an average of 1.44 per thousand persons.

Humboldt has recorded nine single family starts to the end of June 2006 which is an increase from five starts recorded in the same period during 2005. **Building Permits &**

Bylaw Enforcement

Humboldt had a great year in 2005 with a total value of \$3,013,950 of building permits. 47 residential, five commercial, and 10 institutional permits were applied for in 2005.

The Building Licensing Department is responsible for the licensing of all non-resident businesses entering the city, the licensing of all home-based businesses in the city, and the licensing of direct sell-

The building department uses the National Building Code of Canada (NBC), the Uniform Building and Accessibility Standards (UBAS), as well as, city bylaws to govern all construction in the city.

Municipal Economic Strengths

The City of Humboldt is the major service centre within the surrounding region. All amenities that could be expected in a city are present in Humboldt. The city of Humboldt has seen increases in population, assessment and building permits in the last five years.

to all services as well as all facets of health care and education within the city has made Humboldt a very attractive place to call home.





There are many different advantages to making Humboldt your home, from culture to recreation. But what about the basics, like education, health care and protective services?

Education

Humboldt and area caters to both the separate and public schools through the two school divisions.

separate elementary The - St. Dominic and St. schools Augustine Schools, are run by the St. Paul's Roman Catholic Separate School Division No. 20, also known as the Greater Saskatoon Catholic School Division.

The public elementary school Humboldt Public School — is run by the Horizon School Division No. 205.

The high school — Humboldt Collegiate Institute — is currently run by a committee made up of members of both the Catholic and public school boards.

All four of the schools are easily accessible to the students and provide excellent facilities and staff.

If you are interested in postsecondary education Humboldt and area also offers two colleges, St. Peter's College, which is affiliated with the University of Saskatchewan, and Carlton Trail Regional College. Both offer a variety of courses and majors.

Health, Wellness & Social Services

ed within the Saskatoon Health

The Saskatoon Health Region is one of the most integrated and complex health delivery agencies in Canada and serves almost 300,000 residents in more than 100 cities, towns and rural municipalities.

The City of Humboldt is home to St. Elizábeth's Hospital which serves Humboldt and district. The hospital, which has 45 beds, is currently served by 9 doctors.

The doctors on staff provide general medicine and surgery services. Other services provided at the hospital include laboratory, radiology, physiotherapy, palliative care, dietary counseling, cardiology, obstetrics, urology, gynecology, internal medicine, neurology, rheumatology, ears/nose/throat specialists and geriatric services.

Planned construction of the new St. Elizabeth's Hospital in the spring will ensure that 2007 continues the trend of the City of Humboldt as the place to be in the province.

Senior Housing

Humboldt is a growing community and has a large senior population. Humboldt offers two types of Senior Housing:

1) St. Mary's Villa – a

nursing home that is a 101-bed facility that provides Level III and Level IV care for senior citizens and 13 enriched housing units at St. Mary's Villa as well and a private care home in the area.

Housing

Authority - responsible for some senior housing in Humboldt which include: East Side Village, Sunset Manor, Harry Ford Centre, and Senior Semi-Detached Units.

Protective Services The City of Humboldt's protective services personnel are here

to service the residents and surrounding area.

Emergency Response - 911 Fire Protection

The Humboldt Volunteer Fire Department is committed to protecting the community and district and believes in the value of educating the public, especially the children, about fire safety.

Humboldt is a participating member of the Humboldt and District Mutual Aid area with a network of communication servicing the member municipalities.

The Humboldt Fire Department consists of a full-time fire chief and 23 volunteer paid on-call firefighters, both female and male.

equipment Their consists of a 2001 Freightliner fire truck with 1050-gpm pump; 1973 International 100-foot aerial ladder truck with 840-gpm pump; 1994 Ford half-ton truck for use by the Fire Chief; and a 1946 vintage Chevrolet Maple Leaf fire truck used mostly for parades. Also, to serve the rural areas, the department has a 1987 Ford fire truck with 625-gpm pump and a 1981 Ford Cube Van Rescue Unit.

The Humboldt Fire Department owns an Emergency Response Unit equipped disaster situations.

Police

Policing for the city is pro-vided under contract by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), which has had a long and distinguished presence in the community dating back to its earliest days. The police headquarters is located in the city and the detachment has a complement of 11 officers, who serve the city as well as the surrounding rural area.

Ambulance Service

Ambulance service is provided by the Humboldt Ambulance and District Service, who have their headquarters in the City of Humboldt. The ambulance service serves the City as well as the surrounding rural area.

Quality of Life

The City of Humboldt has a stable agricultural economy, reasonable land prices, trained labour force, and proximity to major urban centres such as Regina, Saskatoon, and Prince Albert. All of these aspects make our city a desirable place to live and work

Humboldt is very proud of the multi-purpose facility called the Humboldt Uniplex. This facility hosts a variety of activities and events. Included in the facility are meeting rooms, hall, arena, curling rink and a beautiful pool with a waterslide.

St. Brieux Regional Park (45 minutes northwest of Humboldt) provides a beautiful lake surrounded by poplar trees, boating, fishing, camping, mini golfing and swimming.

LeRoy Leisureland Regional Park has a manmade sand swimming pool with slides for all to enjoy, along with camping sites, large sand beach, golf, and recreational activities.

McNab Regional Park located in Watson has an outdoor swimming pool, recreational activities, golf and full-service campground.

country skiing and fishing can be enjoyed in Humboldt and area.




The snowmobile trails can take you to Muenster, St. Gregor, Watson and Naicam. You could also join trails that will take you to Melfort or Greenwater

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Action Humboldt: a catalyst for economic change

It was in early 2004, on a cold and stormy night, that the citizens of Humboldt decided to band together to help their community continue to grow and prosper.

It was a presentation on community economic development made by Wayne Robinson of the Estey Centre for Law and Economics in Saskatoon that stimulated much urgency for change within the Humboldt community.

A group of business and community leaders came together and began to lead the creation of an economic development plan.

They formed a steering community and after some initial consultations within the community, Action Humboldt, a catalyst for economic development within this central Saskatchewan region — was born.

The team recognized that

economic development is everyone's business, and elected to follow a novel process for creation of the plan. Instead of hiring a consultant to develop the plan, the team hired the Estey Centre to train a group of 30 community leaders in the skills required for the community to develop a plan itself.

Action Humboldt was therefore the umbrella under which people from all sectors of the community came together to identify problems, solutions and opportunities in regards to economic development within Humboldt and the entire surrounding region.

For over a year, members of Action Humboldt were trained in facilitating effective meetings, the use of business and competitive intelligence, economic and business plan formats, and gathering information from the community, thanks to training done by the Estey Centre. At the same time, they came up with a plan to improve the economy of the region in different sectors, recognized as key to the success of the plan as a whole.

The group developed a vision

statement together with four key areas where results must be delivered if economic development is to succeed. These key result areas (or KRA's as they are now known in the community) were:

- Jobs
- Capital Investment
- Infrastructure

Marketing/communication


The groups dug into the task of developing information on which to base action recommendations, through community discussions and intelligence gathering. This work has held some real surprises!

For example, the group handling Jobs found rather than bringing jobs to the community, the immediate crucial need was to find people for the jobs already here. The group found an approximate seven per cent shortage in workers across the range of skill levels and professions.

In one industry cluster that employs about 1,500 people, this worker-shortage gave rise to a missed employment

opportunity of about \$2.6 million annually, and lost overall economic activity in the range of \$11 million annually.

The group's first recommendations therefore needed to deal with attracting more people to take up the huge opportunities already existing within the region.

The training and planning work was completed after 3,370 person-hours of volunteer effort within the community. The plan was rolled out to regional leaders in May, 2005 and then to the public in June 2005. The June gala rollout event drew an attendance of over 300 people from the community, and from across the province.

The Action Humboldt team then went to work with the business community, economic development authorities, institutions, and municipal governments to implement the plan. Each KRA identified its most urgent projects and project teams have formed to tackle each of these. When the early projects are completed the next group of longer term projects will be undertaken.

The entire group will meet quarterly to share progress and to communicate with the public.

Benefits of Action Humboldt:

1. The economic development plan created directly by this group of community people will have the authenticity and integrity required for effective and successful implementation.

2. The skills developed within the community have already delivered a tremendous secondary impact as their use is continued in businesses and community groups.

Funding: This project was supported agencies and businesses, and by volunteers whose time and efforts were a huge contribution.

2006 update

2006, early Action Humboldt held its first quarterly update session, where members of the KRA groups each updated the entire group on their progress with various projects and their group's focus

JOBS KRA

1. Donald Cooper Marketing Seminar on November 2005 that was spearheaded by the Jobs KRA and Michelle Bankowski of the steering committee. About 150 - 160 people came to the seminar, and there were very good comments and good information. An afternoon working session was held to develop a regional code of conduct, at which about 15 people participated. The information was used to develop a draft, which is in the hands of the Jobs KRA for review.

The purpose of the Regional Code of Conduct is to:

- · Foster a positive working and living environment in the region
- · Attract and retain a skilled and diversified work force
- "Business Create a Friendly" region, where people want to live, work and retire
- · Establish a framework for, and promote high standards of, business practice
- Provide a benchmark for signatories to use for selfevaluation.
- · Finalize the draft within our KRA
- · Circulate draft to several key businesses in the region for input
- · Hopefully find someone to lead the initiative
- 2. The creation of a regional Job Bank was identified as a need early by the KRA. A committee was set up to develop the initiative

The SaskJobs site was identified as a good site to work with instead of developing another one, and the Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce volunteered to take this on and develop it.

3. Immigration: There are allenges that businesses challenges in the region are having with immigration. The Jobs KRA has looked at options, and the Carlton Trail REDA has a project underway, the focus of which appears to be more on assisting immigrants once they are here, while a large issue for most businesses is getting immigrants here.

There was some discussion about forming a user group of businesses that could get together and discuss problems and could maybe also work as a coordinated group to take issues forward to immigration officials, etc.

Future Projects: Some things were talked about were some youth initiatives such as a mentorship program, employment readiness is school program.

Closing: We definitely need more skilled labour in the region. Every day you read or hear about shortages in most parts of Canada. We need to keep forging ahead as a

region to collectively address the issue.

INFRASTRUCTURE KRA

1. Regarding the development of Humboldt's Industrial Park, a selection of cities were interviewed regarding their industrial parks, and a list of recommendations was prepared in a report submitted to City Council in the fall of 2005.

On January 1, 2006 the City implemented three new tax incentive policies: Existing Business Expansion, New Business Incentive, Humboldt Builds.

The city's web site has been

updated to include a profile on the Industrial Park, and the city will be hiring an Economic Development Officer. A cost of \$17.000 for a feasibility study/ construction in the Industrial Park is up for consideration in the next budget.

2. Regarding the possible development of a Truck and RV Stop, a "drive around" discussion was held with a City Representative surveying possible sites, and a survey for truck drivers was developed.

Both the survey and recommendations were presented in a report to City Council in the fall of 2005.

City council was concerned this type of stop might be

more for private business to develop.

3. The new St. Elizabeth's Hospital: -Maurice Plemel sits on a committee representing Action Humboldt to keep people informed as to the discussions that are taking place.

4. One of the major projects on rural infrastructure at this time is Highway 368. This is a serious issue that needs to be dealt with because the communities are being affected by the bad condition this highway

Other areas requiring investigation include:

✓ Truck and RV stops cre-



History and culture abound in area


The history and culture of Humboldt and area comes alive through the many attractions.

The Humboldt & District Museum & Gallery offers a unique view of the multicultural heritage of Humboldt and area.

While visiting the Museum you can tour a replica of the 1878 Humboldt Telegraph Station, and see the 1963 stain glass window from the Ursuline Convent at Bruno. The Sports Hall of Fame collection features legends like Glenn Hall and Leo Parker, or attend one of the many exhibits or events held at the Museum.

The Willkommen Centre on Main Street is the information centre for Humboldt beginnings. Inside you may view information about St. Peter's Colony; Alexander von Humboldt and much more. During the Christmas season make sure you drop in to view the beautiful and intricate Bodendein Nativity Scene.

Humboldt's Historic Water Tower, built in 1915, is one of only four such structures remaining in the province. The exterior design is striking due to its resemblance of a coastal lighthouse. During the summer months, or by phone call be sure to stop by for a



tour of the Water Tower.

Humboldt's Historical Murals provide the feeling of an outdoor art gallery. There are eight murals that depict Humboldt and area history painted on the walls of businesses and halls throughout downtown.

The Humboldt & Area Vintage & Antique Club is an agricultural museum that takes a realistic look back at life on the farm from about 1900 to 1960. The main museum building houses tractors from 1927-1954, threshing machines and many other farm implements, while the outdoor exhibits feature a large antique barn and a vintage

farmhouse.

Once a year hundreds of people attend the demonstration the members put on for example threshing, wood sawing, cow milking, blacksmithing and others.

St. Peter's Abbey was the first Benedictine monastery in Canada and invites visitors to visit and follow a self-guided tour of the grounds. The focal point of St. Peter's Abbey is Sts Peter and Paul Church. While there you will also see the stained glass windows, the bell tower and so much more.

Across the highway from the monastery and abbey is **St. Peter's Cathedral**, which was built from 1908-1910. The inside of the cathedral was painted by renowned artist Berthold Imhoff. The paintings are steeped in religious tradition, and feature scenes from the life of Jesus and the many saints the German Catholic pioneers turned to as Christian examples and teachers.

Assumption Church in Marysburg dates back to 1903, at which the first small log church was used until the parish outgrew this building.

In 1919 during the construction of a new addition, a cyclone completely destroyed the church. Afterwards, a new structure was built of brick, to ensure that it would last. And last it has. In the past few years, the community of Marysburg has rallied around the church, holding fund-raisers like the Marysburg Summer Festival of Arts, in order to aid their restoration efforts both inside and outside the church.

The inside of the church, now nearly completely restored, is decorated by numerous paintings by celebrated artist Berthold Imhoff, which have also been restored.

The Marysburg Project: Watching Women is a 24-foot tall, 3,200 lb women made out of plaster, located about one kilometer east of Assumption Church in Marysburg. The sculpture was created because life in the pioneer era seemed to be an enormous amount of work and a lot of the knowledge they had back then has not been passed down. The sculpture is in honour of the many women throughout the pioneer era.

Mount Carmel, named after the famous Mount Carmel in Israel, is the highest spot in the district. Every July for 75 years over a thousand people of the Catholic faith have come to Mount Carmel and made the pilgrimage to the top of hill, where a statue of Our Lady of Mount Carmel and a shrine stand.

Industry key to Humboldt and region economy

The Humboldt region is a manufacturing hub in the province. Many industries, some agriculture-based, have their homes in the area.

This circle of industry has been noted by many, including governments and other manufacturers. The people who work in these industries come from near and far. Companies in the Humboldt region have been dealing with a shortage of skilled labour for several years and have come up with a number of solutions to deal with the problem.

These solutions include above average wages and benefits for those who choose to work there. Even with those things to draw workers, the companies have been forced to look outside the province and even the country for people to fill the jobs they have available.

More and more of the companies are hiring immigrants and helping them to come to Canada to fulfill their labour needs.


